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Times are Changing

When the Administrative Council met in January to start the new year, we found ourselves discussing many ministry ideas. You are reading one of those ideas. That's right, the Broadcaster was on that list. When exploring the possibility of a digital Broadcaster, we asked what would that look like? How would it work? How would people without an e-mail address or a computer for that matter, keep up on the news of the church? But the most exciting question asked that evening was "What are the possibilities of a digital Broadcaster?" This is the first month when we discover the answers to those questions.

This idea is really born of many motivations. The first is an issue of stewardship. The printed Broadcaster costs the church more then \$300 each month to print and mail to our growing membership. Printing them on the church machine takes it's toll, costing more money for repairs and maintenance. That means \$3,600 every year was spent producing and distributing the Broadcaster. The digital version costs us nothing. Allowing us to use those funds to further the growing ministries of the church.

The second issue is one of format. We all know it. Technologies are advancing and creating so many opportunities to share the Good News with the world. Web sites, smart phones, and social media are transforming the ways in which we communicate. Inspired by the very successful transformation of our church web site, we have opportu-

nities to take advantage of the many talents in our congregation and new technologies to create a Broadcaster for the 21st century. With more and more young people finding God through the ministries of this congregation, we can produce a newsletter accessible in so many new and exciting ways.

The final issue may be on the minds of people uncomfortable with technologies. This move to the digital format will never keep you from having the familiar printed version. When you get the digital Broadcaster in your e-mail in-box, you will be able to print all or part of it. And if you alert the church office, we will print a paper version that you can pick up at church.

We want to make the Broadcast accessible to everyone and work with you to get the version which suits your needs. UNITED METHODIST WOMEN

Beth Hyde from Peaks & Plains, Greeley district chair of membership, nurture, and outreach was the guest speaker at the March UMW meeting. The title of the program was "Seeing the Power of Sisterhood." She began by giving a brief review of her own life. Beth divorced her abusive husband because it was, "a war zone in my house." Her husband was hurting the children by using them to hurt her. Her daughter developed a rare disease, a second daughter developed migraine headaches, and her son had asthma attacks because of this family's disruptive life. After the divorce, the children's health improved. Beth went to college and was grateful to have received help from Rev. Paul Stone on campus. Over time he helped her realize that she was not the failure her abusive husband told her she was. Rev. Stone helped her children feel protected. Beth worked at Salvation Army's Booth Home for unwed mothers and saw molested thirteen-year-olds give birth. After graduation she became a teacher and taught for 16 years at the McCurdy Charter School at Espanola Valley, New Mexico. The McCurdy School taught disadvantaged, abused, ethnic students and their mothers. She told UMW members about the cases she had experienced while teaching. Beth asked members, "Do you know of a child who looks lost, won't look up, stares at their hands when addressed? These are children who are troubled." She encouraged members to become aware of troubled children in the community and remind members that the purpose of the sisterhood of United Methodist Women is to help women and children. Beth went on to tell about the success of the McCurdy Charter School stating that 90 percent of the students

go on to college or trade schools or go into the military—one student was accepted at West Point. In 2011 Beth had to have a hysterectomy. The Methodist UMW in El Paso reached out with food and care for Beth and her children. She remembers how the UMW, acting together in sisterhood, poured out love, care, and generosity to her family when they needed it the most.

Vice-president Cathy Fiscus drew members attention to a child's drawing in the prayer calendar of a snowman's buttoned face. She read what Deaconess Valerie Mossman-Celestin, US director of Haitian Artisans, envisioned for Haitian women, 'The achievement of respect in equality, spiritual willingness to achieve Shalom...on earth as it is in heaven."

Cathy presented an article from the February 2013 Response magazine about a UMW celebration of sisterhood development in mission work. "Like Jesus brought the good news of salvation-wholeness to all persons, UMW members not only become 'whole-persons through Jesus,' but are challenged to help make it possible for others to experience the same."

The next UMW meeting will be Saturday, April 6, at 9:15 a.m. The title of the program will be "Telling the Story – Spiritual Growth", presented by Gwen Stieber. Refreshments will be served by Marilyn Ames. The next Esther Circle will meet April 23 at BUMC. Joan Hahn will host and Carol Franks will give the program.

STEPHEN MINISTRY

Stephen Ministry: It is written in Proverbs 12:18 "Reckless words pierce like a sword, but the tongue of the wise brings healing." All through the Bible we are reminded about the power of words. When God spoke, things happened, waters parted, day became night, locust swarmed the earth, and men stopped what they were doing and listened. God's words promised healing, forgiveness and new life. As Stephen Ministers, we deliver God's comforting words through what we say and what we do. Also, through listening we help the care receiver put their innermost feelings into words. This act of expressing their feelings can help them find healing and hope.


In module 9 we learned that one of the corner stones of this ministry is

"CONFIDENTIALITY". Without the promise that everything discussed between a care receiver and a care giver is confidential, the healing process will not happen. For a person to heal, they must be able to discover the core of their pain or sadness, and be able to talk about it with their Stephen Minister. Even in our twice-monthly training and reviews, that confidentiality is upheld. Words can easily harm us, or they can build us up. As a Stephen Minister we know and understand the importance of confidentiality for God's healing to happen. We ask that you always respect us for our commitment to this promise.

We learned about "Telecare, The Next Best Thing to Being There!" in module 10. We have so many options of communication today. Could you imagine what it would have been like 2,000 years ago if Paul could have had a telephone available? "Hello Timothy, this is Paul. I am worried sick about the Corinthians. How are they doing? Are they still fighting? Are their ministries still growing? Have they built any new

churches? Tell them I said, 'There is only one leader and

that's



Jesus, the rest of us are just his servants.'
Call me tomorrow and tell me what they
said." Just think what Paul would have accomplished had he had an I-phone!

Part of being a Stephen Minister is being available. There will be times when we, as Stephen Ministers, will need to speak to our care receiver, and times when our care receiver will need to speak to us. The phone can fill that need. We looked at the ways in which the phone conversation is different versus a conversation person. And looked at how to overcome these differences and still be effect in the healing process.

"Using Mental Health Professionals and Other Community Resources" from module

11 was interesting and informative about what a Stephen Minister is, what is expected from a Stephen Minister, and what we are qualified to do. I have been teaching about how we don't fix things, that God takes care of that. You might say the definition of a Stephen Minister is "a member of our congregation who has received special training to provide one-to-one Christian care to people in our congregation and our community who are experiencing grief, loneliness, divorce, hospitalization, disability, job loss, and many other life difficulties. We will listen, we will be there for you, we will walk beside you as Jesus does, and we will pray with you, as you heal in God's name."



The training required to become a Stephen Minister is 50 hours or 17 training sessions. When completed, we are not fay pastors or lay ministers, we are not therapist or psychologist, and we are not counselors. This module teaches us there are times we may encounter challenges beyond our training and it's ok to refer our care receiver to someone with professional training. God gives each of us gifts to use to help others. The Stephen Ministry teaches us how to use those gifts and the knowledge to know when to seek a higher authority or professional.

In module 12 it became very apparent why we all have answered God's call to serve. "Ministering to Those Experiencing Grief" taught us there are three stages of grief: shock, recoil, and rebuilding. We discussed what care receivers are likely to experience in each of the stages of the grieving process. We discussed feelings of grief in our own lives, causing the use of many tissues.

We discussed several types of events that can bring grief in a person's life and how to comfort and console that person. We

revisited items discussed in module 2 about feelings. Identifying what a person is feeling, understanding the characteristics of those feelings and how to be there for a person who is grieving. We learned specific ways to care for grieving people in each of the stages of the grieving process. You could feel the power of Jesus Christ at work that night.

A Caring Tip..... If you know of someone who is facing one of life's challenges, call them up, stop by and have coffee with them. Then, just listen. That's all it takes to make a difference. We were called to be witnesses, not lawyers.

Remember, when you reach out to a hurting person, you are not alone. As Stephen Ministers learn in their training, Christ is at work in you and through you to bring hope and healing to the other person.
